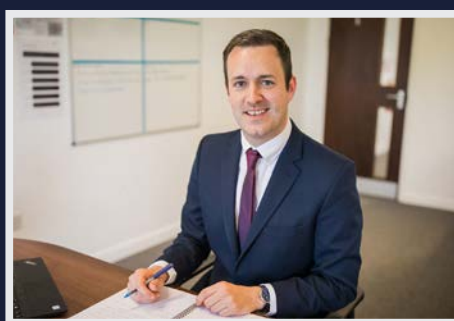

Ofsted Success at Deanwood!

Deanwood Primary School continues to be a "Good" school in their recent Ofsted inspection, maintaining their previous inspection result.

Inspectors highlighted that *"Pupils enjoy coming to school at Deanwood. This is clear in the positive ways that they interact with one another."*

The report highlights how children within the Early Years at Deanwood get off to a strong start in their education. Inspectors said *"Children in early years start their education strongly. Staff set clear and high expectations for what every child will learn, and this helps them to achieve well and be ready for the next stage of learning."*

Jane Wright, Principal at Deanwood Primary School said *"We are absolutely overjoyed with the outcome of this inspection. It has been a challenging year for us at Deanwood following the sudden death of our Assistant Head last academic year. However, this outcome reflects the hard work that has been put in by all staff and the amazing resilience of the whole school community."*

Temple Mill Primary School continues to be a "Good" school in their recent Ofsted inspection, maintaining their previous inspection result. Inspectors highlighted that *"Pupils are rightly proud of their nurturing and inclusive school. They love coming to school and enjoy learning"*, and that *"Staff know the pupils very well and there are strong and trusting relationships"*.

The report found that *"The school is determined that all pupils, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), will achieve their very best. This is embedded in the school motto of 'Give your best, expect success', which is demonstrated very well in every aspect of school life."*

Other highlights of the report noted the school's many leadership opportunities for pupils, its *"broad and ambitious"* curriculum, and the *"purposeful"* and *"calm, ordered and supportive"* lessons, delivered by *"a strong team who are proud and happy to work at the school"*.

Lisa Lewis, Principal at Temple Mill said *"We are delighted with the outcome of this inspection and thrilled that so many of our most valued qualities have been recognised in the report. The children and staff, and our families, at Temple Mill have worked through a very challenging year and have been able to show what an amazing and resilient team we are. I am very proud of us all."*

Central Team News

Mental Health Awareness Week

"One of the most important things we can do to help protect our mental health is regular movement. Our bodies and our minds are connected, so looking after ourselves physically also helps us prevent problems with our mental health. Exercise releases "feel good" hormones, that reduce feelings of stress and anger. It can improve our sleep too. Despite these benefits, so many of us struggle to move enough. We know there are many different reasons for this, so this Mental Health Awareness Week we want to help people to find moments for movement in their daily routines."

To celebrate Mental Health Awareness Week, we have been encouraging staff across the Trust to get moving with a Trust-wide Steps Warrior Challenge! For the next 30 days, members of staff across our academies and Central Team will be competing to do the most steps, with prizes up for grabs. We'll share the winners in our Term 6 Newsletter.

Staff in the THAT Central Team also took part in Yo-Yo OFFICE®'s 'The Big Wiggle', which encourages staff to get moving during the work day. They made a conscious effort to stand when they could, making standing phone calls, having walking meetings, and using the stairs rather than the lift.



How else are we focussing on Mental Health?

We trained 12 new members of staff in Mental Health First Aid for Adults last term. The MHFAiders in our school are a point of contact, and staff are encouraged to contact a MHFAider from any school within the Trust if they are struggling and would like to talk to someone.

Our academies also highlighted the importance of Mental Health during this week, encouraging students to Wear it Green. Deanwood extended their daily mile, encouraging students to complete the mile via hopping, skipping and jumping.

At The Abbey School, Years 7-12 attended a 'Running out of batteries' assembly, exploring how we can attend to our own 'mood battery' to support our mental health and well-being. Year 8 also took part in a Still Waters project developed to coincide with Mental Health Awareness Week. Through a full day of class-based workshops centred around the theme of water - its sound, weight, and movement - these workshops invited students to consider how water can be used to help create moments of calm within the school environment, and to engage them in thinking critically about their relationship to water more broadly.

Central Team News

MAT Regional Network

We hosted Optimus Education's South East MAT Regional Network at The Howard School. Chaired by our Chief Executive, Owen McColgan, attendees discussed how we can foster an inclusive educational culture, and how collaboration among stakeholders can enhance student outcomes. We also considered what strategies are most effective in encouraging community engagement to harness local expertise and resources.

Feedback for the event was positive, with one colleague highlighting "the ability to talk and discuss common challenges with colleagues who shape the direction of their Trust."



Pupil Parliament

On Tuesday 21st of May, pupils across our academies attended our Trust Pupil Parliament. The key focus this time around was the ways in which we can make each school more environmentally friendly.

Suggestions included:

- having light sensors in hallways and bathrooms to reduce the amount of energy wasted on lights
- organising separate bins for paper, plastic, glass and cans
- using laptops to decrease the amount of paper used in lessons
- removing plastic cups from canteens and replacing with washable cups



Staff Awards Update

We received a phenomenal 1287 nominations for this year's THAT Staff Awards, beating last year's record of 750 by over 500 nominations!

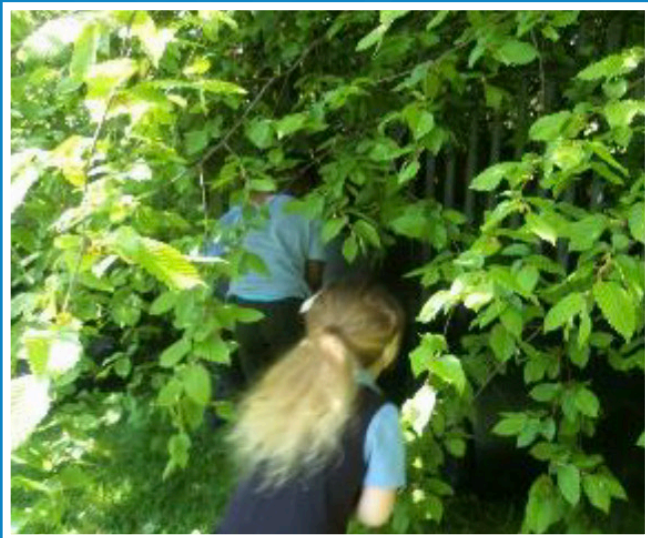




The Living Land Experience

Willow Class joined Year 3 on a trip to The Living Land Experience at Detling Showground, learning all about farming in and around Kent.

Our school trip was lots of fun, and the children really enjoyed learning about all the farming machinery and seeing all the animals. The children saw a range of large scaled machinery that is used to work the fields and farms to produce crops throughout the year. There was also a team from New Zealand which presented a live show of sheep brands.



We're Going On A Bug Hunt

In their Science lessons, Maple Class have been learning all about invertebrates. We went on a walk around the school grounds to see what animals we could find, and decided if they were vertebrates or invertebrates.

We used iPads to research 4 different invertebrates and presented our findings to Year R, who have been learning about minibeasts. Year R have been exploring their habitats in their outside area, as well as learning about the life cycle of a butterfly - looking after their own caterpillars and witnessing the life cycle first hand.

Harry Potter Studio Tour

We took 65 children from Years 4, 5 and 6 to The Harry Potter Studio Tour. We had a brilliant time exploring the sets and completing our 'passports' with all the stamps scattered around the site. Some also chose to have their photo taken on the broomstick with a green screen background.

We need to say a big thank you to Mrs Turner for organising the trip as well as all the staff and volunteers who made the trip a success! We also need to thank the children for their excellent behaviour - we are always proud to take our Deanwood children out as they represent the school so well.

A Magical Evening

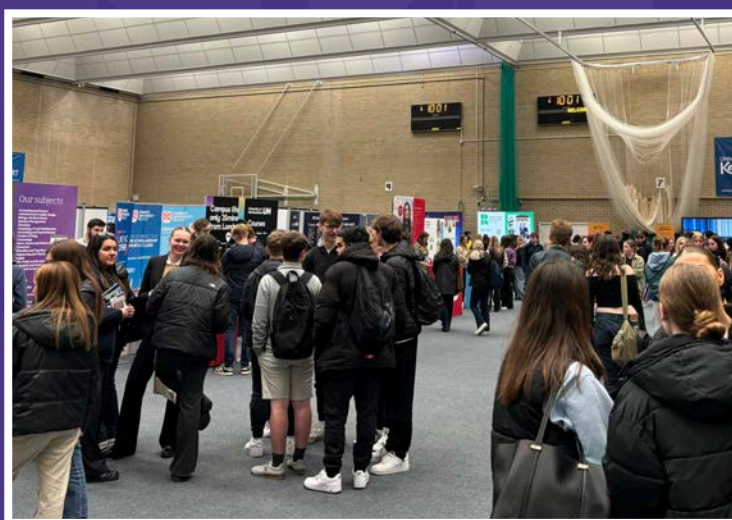

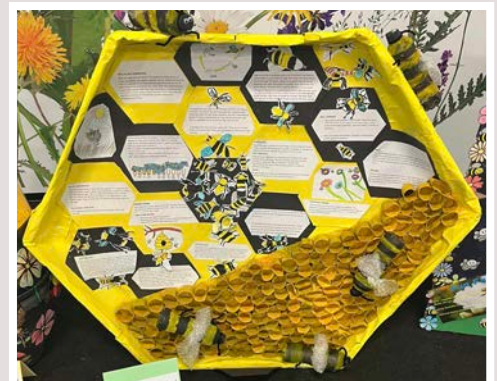

Science and DT with Year 4

This term in DT, Year 4 have been learning about mechanisms and how things move. They combined this with their Geography study of the USA and their science knowledge of electricity to make model cars with moving wheels and working headlights to travel down Route 66!



We also celebrated Science Day! The children got to take part in a range of experiments, from exploring non-newtonian fluids and making lava lamps, to experimenting with acids and alkalis. The children were even able to explore how polymers work, by pushing pencils through bags of water without leaking, and were able to make letters float off of plates and catch them with paper! There were two demonstrations in the afternoon, creating elephant's toothpaste, and even using fire to create a chemical snake!

They spotted many features of a castle from their Hook day learning, including a portcullis, battlements, bailey and keep.

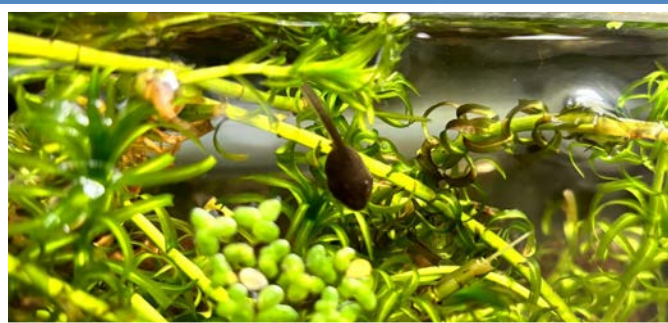


Eco Shop Keeps Growing

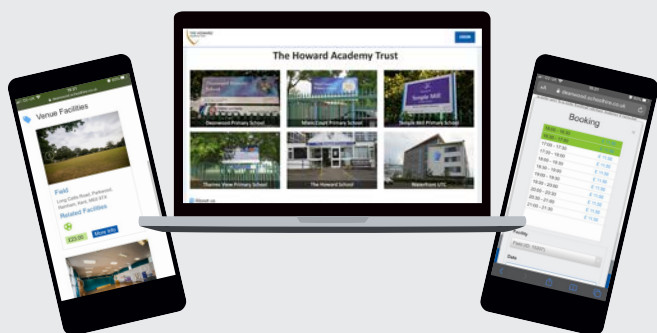
support, as well as opportunities to progress in your career with access to Middle and Senior Leadership Courses, role specific training courses for associate staff, and career stage CPD.
