






Dear Parents, Carers and Colleagues,

In this edition of our Termly THAT Newsletter, we look back at the accomplishments and achievements from our academies over the last two months, as well as highlighting some of the most exciting events that took place.

Schools were fortunate to welcome a vast number of guests and speakers through their doors this term, to speak to both students and staff alike, and to heighten their learning. 

We were lucky to have Morgan Clarke and Russell Crawford from Enable deliver the introduction and design brief to our Year 10 DEC class (Design, Engineer, Construct). Russell shared his knowledge in electrical engineering, while Morgan provided information surrounding what work our student's projects will be based on. The focus of the project will be based around Network Rail's project in Reading, a new substation, built to power a community hub while also incorporating a renewable energy source for a sustainable project.

Our students are looking forward to getting started on this project, and receiving the employer delivery only amplified this! We appreciate the preparation and the time taken to help deliver this project face to face with our students ,and we look forward to planning future visits including potential site visits through the course of this two-year project.



Careers Fair

We held another fantastic Careers Fair today, with a huge number of employers in attendance.

Amongst our visitors, we were fortunate to welcome a number of former students, who are now in apprenticeships or full time employment with these employers. This proves to be a valuable inspiration for our current students, highlighting the possibilities available to them once they leave the UTC.





Students were eager to engage with representatives and received valuable information regarding the opportunities available. This included apprenticeship schemes, work experience, industrial placements and engineering taster weeks, which are available for students to apply to. The final score was SJF 2 - 6 UTC!






In Memory of Ann Gee

Reptiles in the Classroom

We recently invited RDJ Reptiles to bring some animals into Year 3 so that we could continue our learning about skeletons and muscles. Jay spoke to us all about Savannah Monitors, Bearded Dragons, Chameleons, Boa Constrictors and Burmese Pythons.

We had a chance to feel how snakes move their bodies and discussed how they use thousands of muscles to move themselves (humans only have about 600). After feeling their muscles and their spine, we then tried to draw what we thought a snake's skeleton may look like, before we looked at pictures on the computer to compare our ideas.







Vile Victorians

Lions Class dressed up and had an experience day as Victorians. Children were given new names, chalk and chants to learn. Mrs Champness played the part of the strict school mistress; inspecting cleanliness of hands, teaching the rules, taking drill, making gruel, and walking about with the cane!

The class played as factory workers, watched scenes from the movie 'Oliver!', and listened to tales of a school room. Costumes intrigued children from other years and adults on school tours were thoroughly entertained! Year 1s had time with Year 5s at the end of the day to share their knowledge about Charles Dickens and listen to facts about the 1800s.

What Is Sound?

Leopards Class have been exploring "What is Sound?" this term, and this week they have learned about how sound travels and how vibrations are linked to this. We used tuning forks to see how strong vibrations can be when they are in water (this caused quite a splash!) and we banged on drums to see how the vibrations made rice jump.

We also made our own box guitars and pan pipes, and investigated how we can change the volume and pitch of a sound. Leopards Class have all been excellent scientists and great team members this week.

Trip to Iceland

40 of our Geography students took a 5-day visit to Iceland. They landed just as the sun had started to set, and begun with a night-time tour to spot the aurora borealis (Northern Lights). Unfortunately, the search proved unsuccessful.

Day 2 saw our Geographers venture on a South Shore Day. They started the day with a 3 hour glacier walk with the most amazing views. Their journey then took them to the black sand beaches with some strong winds and even stronger Atlantic waves. They finished the day with two famous waterfalls, having visited Skogarfoss where Game of Thrones was filmed, and then Seljalandsfoss, where they could walk all the way around the plunge pool. An amazing day with some amazing memories for these students!



second night, students were rewarded with a spectacular display of the aurora borealis. Students stayed up late with staff to watch this incredible moment and they all captured many beautiful images, videos and memories of this event.

After a disappointing search on Monday evening, on the



Day 3 started at a geothermal power plant, learning about Iceland's sustainable use of renewable energy. Students visited Gullfoss (the golden falls), Geyser and then Thingvellir National Park to see a tectonic plate boundary. It was a day full of tectonic activity, but we managed to visit a geothermal greenhouse and try some samples of fresh cherry tomatoes. The last journey of the day returned everyone to Reykjavik for dinner and a relaxing evening.



The fourth day was interrupted by the earthquakes on the Reykjanes peninsula, but that didn't stop our Geographers! They arrived at the Sky Lagoon and were in the geothermal spa for sunrise at 10am! Students enjoyed the ice plunge pool and spending 2 hours in this geothermal infinity pool overlooking the Reykjavik bay. The afternoon was then spent on a walking tour of Iceland's capital city, finishing with the Viking boat statue overlooking the harbour ahead of an evening of bowling, before setting home the following morning.
